



MEANINGFUL YOUTH ENGAGEMENT ON OPERATIONAL LEVEL: INDICATIVE MENU OF OPTIONS

Introduction

The following matrices of youth engagement listed by voice, insight and action categories prepared for youth will different engagement rolls are illustrative only. They have been developed as part of a desk study and cover youth engagement in the following anti-corruption activities: prevention, law enforcement public outreach/awareness-raising and education. This Menu of Options shows indicative youth engagement activities (the WHAT of youth engagement) and should be further developed jointly with anti-corruption authorities as part of a systematic monitoring of meaningful youth engagement. This Table can be used in the **“Policy Guide for National Anti-Corruption Authorities on Meaningful Youth Engagement in Anti-Corruption Work”**. Step 2 and Step 3 of the Chapter 3 Operational Level: Integrate meaningful youth engagement into anti-corruption authority work to help identify specific voice, insight, action youth engagement activities which may contribute to delivering on anti-corruption authority objectives. This Menu of Options is illustrative and should be updated with anti-corruption authorities in a systematic manner alongside case studies of youth engagement implementation efforts allowing the learnings to be analyzed. Linking youth engagement inputs to implementation methods (the HOW of youth engagement) and monitoring the efficiency and effectiveness of the results would help deepen anti-corruption authority understanding of meaningful youth engagement and the benefits it may bring. Toolkits covering the detailed selection of youth engagement activities and mechanisms for monitoring results are required to help anti-corruption authorities on their meaningful youth engagement journeys.
